VISION

The vision of the Eucaland Project is to consider the European Agricultural Landscape (EAL) as part of our cultural heritage, including the values and meaning it has for the people of Europe today.



GOALS

- To describe the EAL from past to present, promoting common debates and solutions
- To put forward a proposal for a European classification of agricultural landscapes historically-informed within the framework of both the European Landscape Convention (ELC) and the World Heritage Convention (WHC)
- To suggest alternative ways to consider our future agricultural landscapes, applying a more cultural and sustainable approach
- To inform scientists, planners, policy makers and especially the people of Europe

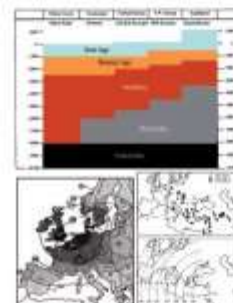


WP2 Landscape History: Major stages in the evolution of EAL

The development of many of the characteristic features of the EAL shows the historical passage of time. The aim is to summarise the history of the EAL and to point out similarities and differences between the countries. Partners therefore collect available data in their countries, outlining the development of their EAL and considering its evolution over time.

WP1 Landscape Description: Methods, definitions, cultural character and values

Agricultural landscapes are not just perceived in terms of farming and natural features, but also as a common heritage carrying social and cultural values. The aim is to identify the characteristic components of the EAL, highlighting the cultural, social and psychological benefits for the well-being of the citizens and trends for future developments.

WP3 Landscape Classification: Characterisation and classification methods

The aim is to reach consensus for a first classification approach to EAL, to be debated throughout Europe. Such a classification will move on from the various existing European landscape classifications towards a new focus on agricultural landscape types, viewed as the product of history, underlying general aspects and similarities among them. The resulting structure will then be presented at European level.

WP5 Landscape Planning: Recommendation for the consideration of EAL cultural values at heritage

The main aim is to incorporate different European viewpoints and economic, social and ecologic trends, when considering cultural values and the heritage of the EAL. From this, recommendations will be drawn up for use as guidelines for politicians, scientists and planners, aimed at making the wider population in Europe more aware of their past cultural heritage and hence better able to plan their future landscape.



WP6 Dissemination of Results

The results of the project are disseminated to the wider public via websites, travelling exhibition, presentations, publications and other means. Two major outputs will be the final conference and the project book. The Online Collaboration Site for the project partners, hosted by the University of Cambridge, is a valuable tool for internal discussion, communication and dissemination with wiki page, glossary, file storage, calendar and other resources.
